Social Justice Committee Report

We continue to confirm our commitment to educating ourselves about the Indigenous People who were the original caretakers of our land. All agreed that the 'Braiding Sweetgrass' book group was educational and filled with wisdom that we are bringing into our daily lives. The committee plans on leading another group in the spring and will be reading "Native" by Kaitlin Curtice. Dates to follow.

Our church and our community are calling us to listen, gather and record the stories of the elders in our church. The process can indeed be difficult as we look at the truth of the role of our church in the challenging and/or the sustaining of Sundown Laws. "The stories become a journey to the truth and so even the way they are told and what is said or not said becomes quite powerful".

There continue to be many opportunities for us to look at the history of the Episcopal Church around social and racial justice. The Sacred Ground series will again be available to start in January. Other opportunities through the Absalom Jones Center and our own diocese continue to be made available to us. Our church will be holding a book group on the book, "Dear Church" (A Love letter from a Black Preacher to the Whitest Denomination in the US) by Lenny Duncan. Copies are available for you to borrow and we will be meeting on the first Sunday in January after church.

Rogue Retreat here in Grants Pass continues to need paper towels, toilet paper and nightly meals for residents. You can sign up on Meal train though we all agree that it is easier to put together a meal for 25 people when more than one family is involved. Contact Concetta if you are interested.

Thank you to all who have volunteered for the Ministry in the Park. Your donations are also appreciated as we average 20 to 25 lunch bags a week. Needs include jam or jelly, applesauce or other soft snack, hard-boiled eggs, sandwich bags, small juice, or water. We are also going to start collecting hats, gloves, hand, and foot warmers as well as socks for the folks at the park.

Worship Advisory Committee Report

The committee continues to look at various resources for our Prayers of the People and would appreciate your suggestions. Alison Huber has been exploring music options in the community while continuing to work with Elizabeth our organist. The committee is still interested in holding a Taize service on the second Sunday of each month at 4 PM. The hope is to begin this in January.

Bishop Akiyama has asked churches in the diocese to consider doing a Lectio Divina on one Sunday a month instead of a Sermon. The hope is that the parishioners will become more engaged in the Gospel Reading and share their thoughts and feelings about the gospel with each other. Reverend Ernestein will prepare parishioners with the process before we begin. A Thanksgiving Service will be held the Sunday (Nov 20th) before Thanksgiving with a shared meal to follow. This meal is open to the public and all are welcome. Susan Hall will also be asking if any parishioners are interested in sharing a meal on Thanksgiving Day at the church.
