ear St. Luke's Family,

O Come, O Come, Emmanuel....

Now is the time of waiting and preparation... beginnings and endings. We wait for so much... it is the beginning of a new Church Year (and the ending of the civil year) and in the first week of Advent, we prepare our hearts for the coming of the Lord. We also prepare our homes for a time of celebration and reunion. We prepare gifts for those dear to us as a token of our love for them, and in



remembrance of the Gift of a Child in a manger. And the liturgy of Advent moves us along to a time of fulfillment. But for now... the call of John the Baptist reaches out to us: Prepare the Way of the Lord. Make straight his paths.

Here at St. Luke's, there is much preparation and waiting happening. Rev. Ernestein, in her sermon for Advent 1, called us to enter into our hearts and to make room for the Coming Christ, and for our neighbors, in whom we meet the Divine every day. I wish you peace in this time of preparation. One of the privileges of serving on the vestry is that one becomes aware of how much quiet good is done for so many. I thank you for this. You are a hope and inspiration for me. May you find hope and inspiration at this holy (and hectic) time of the year.

Social Justice Committee Report

e continue to confirm our commitment to educating ourselves about the Indigenous People who were the original caretakers of our land. This past **Indigenous Heritage Month** gave us several opportunities for raising our awareness and understanding of the struggles that still face Indigenous people in our country and community. Rogue Action Center and Native Women Share sponsored a documentary film showing at Barnstormers. **If you missed the showing of "Rumble" you can still watch it on PBS and/or Netflix.** Members of the Takelma Tribe were present in the audience that evening and Reverend Ernestein was able to reach out and explore other educational opportunities for our parish.

Our church and our community are calling us to listen, gather and record the stories of the elders in our church. The process can indeed be difficult as we look at the truth of the role of our church in the challenging and/or the sustaining of Sundown Laws. "The stories become a journey to the truth and so even the way they are told and what is said or not said becomes quite powerful". The Grants Pass Remembrance Project will be sponsoring an evening to honor Dr. Martin Luther King on January 15th. We hope you will plan to attend. (More information to follow.)

There continue to be many opportunities for us to look at the history of the Episcopal Church around social and racial justice. The Sacred Ground series will again be available to start in January. Other opportunities through the Absalom Jones Center and our own diocese continue to be made available to us. The reverend Terrlyn L. Curry was recently in Ashland to discuss her book "Dismantling Racism."

Our church will be holding a book group on the book, "Dear Church" (A Love letter from a Black Preacher to the Whitest Denomination in the US) by Lenny Duncan. Copies are available for you to borrow, and we will be meeting on the first Sunday in January after church. The book discussion group will begin after coffee hour on January 8th. Please mark your calendars.

Rogue Retreat here in Grants Pass continues to need paper towels, toilet paper and nightly meals for residents. You can sign up on Meal train though we all agree that it is easier to put together a meal for 25 people when more than one family is involved. Contact Concetta if you are interested.

Thank you to all who have volunteered for the Ministry in the Park. Your donations have enabled us to average 20 to 25 lunch bags a week. This past month our bags have also included a pair of socks thanks to your generosity. In January we will welcome your involvement with us during the Point in Time Count on January 25th. We plan on having a table at the event that will focus on "Warming our Neighbors, Inside and Out." We will have more information out to you in early January on how you can become involved.
